Among their activities was tackling a challenging jigsaw puzzle of Klimt's "Apple Tree" manufactured by Liberty Puzzles. There was something about the amazing shapes of the pieces that appealed to Eve and me, so we went online and placed an order for a puzzle for ourselves. About 3 weeks after establishing our place in line, we received an email giving us 24 hours to log on and place an order for one puzzle. We had already reviewed the many puzzles available, so we quickly settled on the puzzle, "A Family of Macaws." It took weeks to solve – but we found the challenge of the wooden jigsaw, with its amazing piece shapes, a delightful experience, just as the Jensens had.

Aaron's Answers

Question: What was the Globe Theater of London? Whose plays were performed there? Is the theater still in existence?

Aaron's Answer (A'sA): The Globe Theater of London was a theater created by Shakespeare's playing company, the Lord Chamberlain's Men, in 1599 in London. The Globe Theater was built from timber from the original theater that stood there, called "The Theater." William Shakespeare was one of the shareholders in Lord Chamberlain's Men, and his famous plays were the main ones played at the theater. The original Globe is no longer in existence, having burned down in 1613. During a performance of Henry VIII. a prop cannon misfired and set the rafters and thatch roof on fire. It was at that point that the Globe went up in flames. 'The Globe was rebuilt in 1614, only to be demolished in 1644. Shakespeare's Globe is a new reconstruction of the original and was made in 1997. In February of 2016, a second replica of the Globe Theater, called the Pop-Up Theater was created in Auckland, New Zealand.
