# **Aaron's Answers**

Questions: 1) Credit cards didn't exist in the 1950s - except maybe the Diners Club/Carte Blanche cards. Can you please tell me a bit about the history of those cards and whether they exist anymore?

2) Perhaps, like me, you've sensed something special goes on inside when given a WRAPPED present. Can you tell us anything about the emotional and psychological effects of gift wrapping?

Aaron's Answer (A'sA): The first question is rather interesting. The Diner's Club and Carte Blanche cards were similar to modern day credit cards, and also similar to debit cards. Essentially, they were pieces of plastic that you could use to pay for meals at your convenience. The primary difference between credit cards and those cards was when you had to pay; those cards required a monthly payment of everything you owed, while credit cards are more flexible, but with increasing costs over time. While the Diner's Club and Carte Blanche groups look nothing like they used to, they still sort of exist. Diner's Club actually bought and absorbed Carte Blanche, marketing it as a different type of card. At some point, Mastercard bought Diner's Club, making them a subsidiary. They do still exist, but also kind of don't.

As far as the second question goes, there are a myriad of reasons for why gift-wrapping adds to the gift-giving experience. First of all, gift-wrapping shows a lot of time, care and effort for a gift. The better a gift is continued on page 4
