Fall Maintenance Home Recommendations

As October approaches, prepare your outdoor spaces for the changing seasons. Here are some maintenance tasks to consider:

October

- 1. **Prune Tree Limbs**: Ensure tree limbs are trimmed 6 feet away from roof areas. This helps prevent potential damage during storms and reduces the risk of rodents.

It propagates basic programming principles and habits in a fun way that has, no doubt, contributed to the upsurge in computer knowledge throughout the world. By instilling children with the desire to make something with computers, many a programmer has "cut

his/her teeth" on Scratch. Unfortunately, I'm a bit older than the typical age group that uses Scratch, so I don't know many people who use it, however I know that people do. Both of those changes together have made this generation one of the leading innovators in computer technology, artificial intelligence, and other subjects that can lead humanity to greater

'One Ring' Phone Scam

For illegal robocallers, the goal isn't always getting you to answer. Sometimes, it's getting you to call back. Every so often, your phone may ring once and then stop. If that happens to you, and you do not recognize the number, **do not return the call**. You may be the target of a "one-ring" phone scam.

One-ring calls may appear to be from phone numbers somewhere in the United States, including three initial digits that resemble U.S. area codes. But savvy scammers often use international numbers from regions that also begin with three-digit codes – for

example, "232" goes to Sierra Leone and "809" goes to the Dominican Republic. Scammers may also use spoofing techniques to further mask the number in your caller ID display. If you call back, you risk being connected to a phone number outside the U.S. As a result, you may wind up being charged a fee for connecting, along with significant per-minute fees for as long as they can keep you on the phone. These charges may show up on your bill as premium services, international calling, or toll-calling.

Variations of this scam rely on phony voicemail messages urging you to call a number with an unfamiliar area code to "schedule a delivery" or to notify you about a "sick" relative.

How to avoid this scam

- Don't answer or return any calls from numbers you don't recognize.
- Before calling unfamiliar numbers, check to see if the area code is international.
- If you do not make international calls, ask your phone company to block outgoing international calls on your line.
- Always be cautious, even if a number appears authentic.

Filing a complaint

If you are billed for a call you made as a result of this scam, first try to resolve the matter with your telephone company. If you are unable to resolve it directly, you can file a complaint with the FCC at no cost. You have multiple options for filing a complaint with the FCC. I list two here (see web for other methods):
